
Patterns are all around us: at home; at school; in nature. Where could you find patterns? Here are some ideas...

















Artists and craftsmen have been using patterns in their designs for thousands of years. When do you think these patterns were designed? Are they old or new? How do you know?




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A pattern is created when a shape is repeated many times or in a particular order. Sometimes size or colours can determine a pattern.

Have a look at these patterns. What would come next in the pattern?





















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
